About this Service

This past week, we observed Ascension Day, one of the seven Principal Feasts of the Episcopal Church. Celebrated on the 40th day after Easter (and therefore always on a Thursday), it commemorates the day when Jesus ascended into heaven in the sight of his disciples. It was his final appearance on earth. Each time we say or sing the Creed, Christians affirm our belief that Jesus both rose from the dead and is now exalted in glory. The lectionary readings and musical selections for today, the seventh Sunday of the Easter season, continue to reflect on Christ's ascension and glorification. They also foreshadow the advent of the Holy Spirit, an occasion which will be fêted next Sunday on the day of Pentecost.

Biography of the Rev. Canon Dr. Kortright Davis

Kortright Davis was born in the West Indies on the island of Antigua. He is a graduate of Codrington College in Barbados, the theological college of the Church in the West Indies.

He was ordained deacon in 1965 and a priest in 1966 in his home Diocese, the Diocese of Antigua (now called the Diocese of the North Eastern Caribbean and Aruba). He has served as Rector of several parishes in the Caribbean and was, for some time on the faculty of his alma mater Codrington College. He also served as an Executive Member of the Caribbean Conference of Churches. Currently the Reverend Dr. Davis is Professor of Theology at Howard University School of Divinity. He is also the Rector of Holy Comforter Episcopal Church in Washington, D.C.

He was one of the Archbishop of Canterbury's representatives on the Anglican/Roman Catholic International Commission (ARCIC II). In addition to having been a member of the Faith and Order Commission of the World Council of Churches, he also served as Consultant to several other ecclesiastical bodies and academic institutions.

The Reverend Dr. Davis has earned degrees from the Universities of London, the West Indies and Sussex, where he read for his Doctor of Philosophy. He has had the Honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity (D.D.) conferred on him by General Theological Seminary in New York City, St. Paul's College in Lawrenceville, Virginia, and The Virginia Theological Seminary, Alexandria, Virginia. He has also been the recipient of the Doctor of Laws (LL.D) Honoris Causa, from the University of the West Indies. He is an Honorary Canon of the Diocese of the Windward Islands, and St. John's Cathedral, Antigua, West Indies.

He is the author of several books and articles. His publications include *Emancipation Still Coming?*, *African Creative Expressions of the Divine*, *Can God Save the Church?*, and *Serving With Power*.

He is married to the former Joan Thompson, and they are the proud parents of two daughters and a son, and also grandparents of five.

Meditation: Finishing the Work

In a duet with Dolly Parton, country singer Brad Paisley sings of heaven in the plain-spoken “When I Get Where I’m Going” (Arista Nashville, 2005). Paisley contrasts eternal rest to the common theme many of us feel at the end of the day: “so much work to do.” These are times when people go to work with the flu just to keep jobs that could be downsized. The stakes are higher and the sharks are fiercer as people compete with others to stay employed. And then there are the endless large and small tasks that may fill our days as we care for family members, run a household, serve in our churches and communities, and attend to our physical, emotional, and spiritual needs. When we feel the stress of the constantly unfinished to-do list, it is a relief to hear Jesus’ declaration in today’s gospel that he has finished his work. In his prayer to God the Father he says, “I glorified you on earth by finishing the work that you gave me to do” (John 17:4). Rather than hearing this as an unfavorable assessment of our own unfinished business, perhaps we can receive it as a gift, one that gives our earthly lists eternal perspective. In today’s gospel Jesus is praying for his disciples just before his arrest and betrayal; he knows what is coming, and on the cross just prior to his death he declares: “It is finished” (John 19:30). While it might seem we will never reach the end of our list, always another phone call to return, bills to pay, dirty dishes, or unwashed socks, the most important work is already complete in Jesus Christ: life, death, resurrection. Tomorrow’s work awaits us, but we do not live as those who have no hope. Our ordinary tasks take on deeper meaning through Jesus’ finished work for us.
